Housing First Anglesey 2018 in review



Overview

The Wallich has run the Anglesey Housing First Project since 2013. We were selected to deliver a 12-month pilot project based on the **identified need of supporting 25 people**, who were regularly sleeping rough and/or experiencing repeat homelessness on the island.

Over the past five years, 74% of those we've supported have successfully secured and maintained accommodation. Housing First works on the premise that, rather than expecting a person currently living on the streets to go through several steps to reach independence, they should instead be offered an independent tenancy first with no prerequisites for access and they should receive intensive and assertive support.

Our approach is trauma-informed and follows a therapeutic model of support. This is enhanced by the numerous creative interventions provided by our dedicated participation and progression department such as art therapy classes, heritage-based volunteering, practical qualifications and outdoor activities to name but a few.

The Housing First Network Wales, alongside Cymorth Cymru, has drawn up a set of principles to determine to what extent a project delivers Housing First. The self-assessment comes with a maximum score of 30. The Wallich is pleased to say that Housing First Anglesey clearly operates according to Housing First principles and scores **28**, and we're putting measures in place to increase that even further. The Wallich is also an active member of the Housing First Network, working to promote and shape Housing First across the country.

October – Moved to bigger, more suitable offices within the community hub to enable better support and integration


October - Employed Housing Interventions Officer,
